Dear Friends of ECI,

The last several months have been so difficult for all of us who love and care about Afghanistan and who have worked hard the past couple decades to bring about positive changes. The exodus of talent, rising fear, societal regression, and the acute humanitarian crisis have caused enough blame, anger, regret, and selfdoubt to debilitate even the most committed among us.

And yet, throughout these fraught months, ECI's staff and partners have continued their efforts unabated and with the kind of commitment that comes from knowing--deep down--that their work makes a positive impact on the lives of countless individual Afghans and the society as a whole.

In February, I had the opportunity to see this commitment first hand while on an official trip to Kabul. I had the opportunity to visit ECI's school for children with disabilities, and Window of Hope, the orphanage for disabled children that ECI funds. What I saw was an organization that was not just surviving this difficult period, but thriving and growing more confident in its ability to educate and serve the public, lift up families, and protect vulnerable children. The professionals at the school were focused and dedicated; the students were excited to be there; the kids at Window of Hope were rambunctious and healthy; and the debt I owe them all for soothing and inspiring me can never be repaid.

I have been a part of ECI's work since it's very beginning, when my fellow board members and I were working in Kabul over a decade ago and volunteering at Window of Hope. I've seen the organization evolve from a group of a few volunteers, to a fast-growing, resilient local operation with almost 50 Afghan staff working across six provinces on six programs that protect and support disabled children and their families. And I know that it has taken not only our team's commitment and passion for the work to get to where we are today, even in these troubled times, but it has also equally required the generosity and goodwill of our donors across the globe who believe in our work and support us. Thank you for keeping ECI going.

I hope the updates in this newsletter can bring you a glimpse of the inspiration I witnessed in Kabul this winter. Thank you for your support.

Updates

Humanitarian Relief Work

Since August 2021, the **Frozan Fund** has been focused on implementing emergency relief work for those displaced and those in need due to the increasing humanitarian disaster in Afghanistan. Since August, our team has delivered over **3,000 hot meals** to internally-displaced persons (IDPs) and orphans, **medical aid** to IDP families, and **dry food packages and cash assistance to over 127 families in need**, many with disabilities. This work will continue to be our priority for the Frozan Fund as t h e

Community-based Disability Awareness & Support Program With funding from our key donor, **Minderoo Foundation**, ECI expanded our work to support children

with disabilities into 5 new provinces-in addition to Kabul, we are also now reaching families in Balkh, Herat, Nangarhar, Kandahar and Bamyan. The new program, called the **Community-based Disability Awareness and Support**
